Through our big idea of 'Movers and Shakers', Year 1 decided to explore the different musical instrument families. We listened to the instruments, sorted them, played them and even used our own bodies as instruments. Many children chose to put this learning into practice by designing and making musical instruments in the class construction areas as part of their purple learning challenges.











We have been inspired by the book 'Where The Wild Things Are' this term. We thoroughly enjoyed diving deeper into the story through the drama workshop run by the Corn Exchange. In the story, Max becomes a leader of the wild things so we thought about what it would be like to be a leader of our own islands. We then designed, built and wrote about them - some excellent Imagination used!












The big idea 'Movers and shakers' made the children think about how their bodies moved

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The big idea 'Movers and Shakers' has sent Year 2 into learning all about Great Fire of London, and also to comparing King Charles II and King Charles III.

The children had a great time working together in their classrooms to build Tudor houses, making them look as authentic as possible. We then headed outside where, with Mr Green's help, we recreated the Great Fire of London! The children were amazed to see how quickly the houses were burned, and the ash that was left behind.

















In Forest School, the children have enjoyed their outdoor learning opportunities. We have made Christmas decorations using natural

materials, and had hot chocolate too!









We have been reading Vlad and the Great Fire of London for English this half term, and the children started by making an art sculpture of Boxton the Rat! We then painted them and took them home.





# History and D&T Egyptian Canopic Jars

Year 3s have been making their own canopic jars as part of our Egypt big idea. The children used a combination of mod-rock. Clay and paper mache to create the shape of the jar. We also researched the 'god heads' that the Egyptians displayed on top of the jars to protects the organs inside.







# Butser Ancient Farm School Trip

Year 3 took a trip to Butser Ancient Farm to learn more about life in the Stone Age. The children explored Stone Age homes and discovered the items they would have had inside and how they had been made. The children also got to become archeologist s and excavate artifacts from the Stone Age. They discussed each item and thought about where it would have come from at the period of history it was from. They had a go at weaving with branches and how strong these are, which is useful to pen in animals and mark land boundaries.



Year 4 have had a fantastic few weeks exploring a range of topics through our 'Movers and Shakers' curriculum. We have delved into the conquests of Alexander the Great; explored how predators stay at the top of their food chains; and looked at how symbolism inspires Christians to celebrate the first ever Christmas.

The children have been learning British Sign Language to explore inclusive communication and are now able to perform a Beatles song using sign language! We were also incredibly fortune to have Code Camp visit us as real-life Movers and Shakers. All of Year 4 were innovators for the day and coded their very own computer games!

We hope all our children have a restful holiday season and look forward to more exciting learning opportunities in 2024!





Lime class enjoyed a visit to the Argyles nursing home. We performed our own version of Macbeth, danced to some Tudor music, sang Christmas songs and shared our adventure stories. We all had a brilliant time!













We went to Parkway to see a real Spitfire from World War 2. There were experts there who told us about the aircraft and how they were used in the war. It was so interesting to see such an amazing machine, and to learn more about it. This linked so well to our learning last term about World War 2.



As part of our learning about 'Movers and Shakers', Year 6 have learned about the work of Charles Darwin on evolution and adaptation. We studied his observational drawings of the animals he saw in the Galapagos, and had a go at using some of the techniques

ourselves.









Yesterday Year 6 went to the Natural History Museum in London to take part in an Evolution workshop. The children immersed themselves in learning about the Earth's history told through fossils, plants and animals.

They fully engaged in this fabulous workshop and showed the school values throughout

the trip.


H, Polly G, Hania A, Samuel A-S, Alessia C, Liv H, Vibhuti S, Mollie S and Anna R.

#### **Junior Choir Performance**


