



Last week there was much excitement in Year 2, due to our visit from Finn from Zoolab, with his collection of African animals.

Children got to stroke the different animals: gecko, snake, hissing cockroach and the giant snail. Happily for the adults in the room, Rosie the tarantula was kept safely with Finn!

The children were able to ask lots of questions about the animals and their habitats. All of Year 2 were beautifully behaved, and were calm and composed for our little guests to the school.





This week Year 2 had a visit from Ray from Drum With Us and each class took part in an African drumming workshop.



Ray was extremely knowledgeable and was able to say where the different types of drums were from in Africa. We were taught how to drum on different parts of



the drum, how to keep time, and sing along to the sounds. Everyone had to pay close attention and it was quite hard work! As you can see from the photos, the workshops were a great success.

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Year 2 have enjoyed successful Forest School lessons this half term, which have included making individual wands and discussing fictional characters that may live in the woods.

While making wands, the children first had to sharpen their stick and scrape part of the bark off with a potato peeler. This required a level of skill. They were then able to decorate them using a selection of craft items.







This half term, Year 3 have been learning about our community as part of our whole school big idea 'Creating A Community'.

In Geography, we have been exploring the location and features of our local area. The children have used maps, internet searches and images to explore our locality, in particular, its physical geographical features such as hills, rivers, etc.

We also explored how different communities use of local area and how many of these are linked. The children were particularly interested in the amount of schools and religious buildings in our area.



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Year 5 have had a wonderful term exploring our big idea of 'Creating a Community' and we explored 'Imagine if we were an Anglo-Saxon or Viking'. We started the new term off with an immersive day, where children dressed as Anglo-Saxons. Upon arrival at school they were put straight to work, preparing vegetables for our soup. Children enjoyed singing Anglo-Saxon songs around the camp fire, where they enjoyed the soup they had made. Children also enjoyed designing their own shields, and using clay to create their own bosses. We ended the day practicing our battle cries 'Ut! Ut! Skoll!' and re-enacted battle scenes outside—a lot of fun was had by all!





Our Anglo-Saxon learning didn't stop there, because we went on to learn about law enforcement, the building of communities, and King Alfred in our History lessons. We even explored Bayeux tapestry,

what information we could collect from these sources, and created out own!

We were then able to show case all of our learning by creating a nonchronological report on Anglo-Saxons, in our English lessons.

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Year 5 have been busy in the Make It, Bake It room this term. We were lucky enough to experience working with James and Lewis from FINK Food to create flatbread pizzas with loaded potato skins. The children worked in pairs

to create their own meal and demonstrated all our school values during the task—we were very impressed! The feedback from children was 'it was the best day ever!' and 'that was the tastiest food I've had!'.



Year Six had a brilliant time at Rhos-y-Gwaliau at the start of spring term. The children tackled mighty mountains; explored marvelous mines; tested out their map-reading skills and embraced their sense of adventure!

Courage, determination and resilience were demonstrated in vast quantities as they tackled each and every new challenge that came their way.

All of the children showed amazing team-work and supported each other; many children pushed themselves out of their comfort zones and each and every one of them had a great time.
