Year 1 have had a fantastic start to the year. Exploring new classrooms and a new style of learning.

We have been exploring the big idea 'Brave New World' which has enabled lots of discussions about animals and exploring new worlds in vehicles.

In English we revisited different traditional stories and retold them in different ways, using our independent learning time to create resources to help us. We made puppets, masks, models, story maps and pictures to help us with our retelling.







## **Animals**

We learned about different types of animals and were successful in sorting them into groups.

We investigated the types of food they eat and even examined poo (made from chocolate and oats) to see if they were carnivores, herbivores or omnivores!



We have also been learning about different types of vehicles and the historic figures that invented them. We learned about the Montgolfier brothers' hot air balloon and the Wright brothers plane. Inspired by these inventors we designed our own moving vehicles and using our knowledge of wheels and axles, we built them out of everyday materials and things from around our classrooms.



It's been bug hunting time in Forest School.

We have spent time in the secret garden looking for bugs and exploring their habitats. We carefully used our scientific equipment to observe them closely and pick them up safely.


We also practiced our Maths skills by creating tally charts to count how many of each type of insect we found. There were a LOT of worms under the log seats round the fire pit!







Year 2 have settled in brilliantly this term. We are incredibly proud of the way they have shown our school values of courage, composure and creativity through the embedding of our routines. They have all been fascinated with our learning about Amelia Earhart and Space, and we've loved the children sharing their books, creations and other facts they've learnt at home about the topics. Their enthusiasm has been infectious!

The books we have looked at this term are the following:










In Maths, we have been looking at place value. The children have worked hard at using place value charts, partitioning numbers, ordering numbers, and being able to use the language 'greater than, less than and equal to' to

compare numbers.





#### **Forest School**

The children have loved being outside for their Forest School sessions with Ms Lemoine this term. They have thoroughly embraced all of the opportunities to create dens, make mud faces, mud slides, practice their knots and much more! It has been lovely to see the children working together and coming up with activities independently.













#### **History and DT**

The children have been very engaged with their learning this term in History and DT. We started the term looking at Amelia Earhart and her achievements, producing some beautiful fact files in English. We have then moved onto Space, and learning about Neil Armstrong and the moon landing. The children have been fascinated with this, and have worked collaboratively to create rockets! We mixed up all three classes, and they worked together to work out the materials they would need, the rocket parts and how they would join it together! The results were fantastic, and the children are so proud of their creations.















Our learning about the Stone Age began in a cave! Ms Challis was hiding there ready to talk about her work as an archeologist which she studied before she joined JRS.

We learnt about the tools she used, how she went about her job and what she learnt as an archeologist.



This half term in Year 3 we have been learning about life in the stone age. We have explored what life was like for people living in the stone age including the type of music they might have made, the types of drawings and painting they created and how they survived.

In Art we have created our own stone age paintings. We found out about what the stone age people used to create art such as charcoal and then had a go at recreating this.





In D&T we designed and made our own stone age weapons. We looked and what these would have been made from and how they would have been used.



#### **Science—Rocks and Soils**

As part of our learning on rocks and soils Year 3 had the opportunity to bring in some of their rock collections from home - these were pretty impressive and we used magnifying glasses to explore these in detail.





#### **Chocolate rocks**

Some classes attempted to make sedimentary, metamorphic and igneous rock from 3 different types of chocolate—some were more successful than others but the process helped us to understand how these rocks are formed.



#### **Forest School**

Year 3 have had a lot of fun during Forest School, with Ms Lemoine leading us through some great activities. We have loved opportunities to work as



We began our year thinking about how struggle is part of purple learning. We enjoyed working together to overcome challenges and earn clues to find a mystery box and crack the code to open it.



The adults are incredibly proud of how each child pushed their selves out their comfort zones with trying new activities and new food. What was also incredible to observe was the bond of relationships that the children built with each other and how this has transferred into the classroom since returning!



This term in Science, we have been learning about the circulatory system. We have thoroughly enjoyed learning about how blood moves around the body and the role of the heart and blood. We have produced independent work which we are proud of in our creative responses.
