As you may remember, FS2 hatched eggs from the Living Egg company earlier on this term. We have nurtured the chicks and now they are growing well and are enjoying their new home in with Mars, Twix and Marmite. We experienced a few days of them working out the "pecking order" but all 6 chickens are now happily living alongside one another. It is hard to believe how quickly they changed from chick to chicken. It is so lovely seeing all year groups coming to look after the chickens and using their eggs in the make it bake it room.











This term, we have thoroughly enjoyed learning about the Olympic Games 2024. We have found out about Paris, which is where the Olympic games are taking place, and the Eiffel Tower has been a firm favourite to build and write about in our independent learning. We have listened to some National Anthems and then we have composed and played our own Olympic songs. In art, we have designed and then made our own Olympic mascots using clay. We hope everyone enjoys watching some of the Olympic Games this Summer after so much excellent learning!





The Pop Up Play Village visited us in Year 1 last week and they brought with them a whole world of fun! We designed and built Olympic stadiums in the construction area; we looked after the athletes' children in the nursery; we wrote and sent letters from Paris; we looked after injured athletes in the hospital; and went shopping for healthy foods to keep athletes well fed. It was so lovely to see the children happily playing and using their imaginations so well!





















In Geography we have been learning about maps. We looked at different types of maps and the symbols used to represent different things.

We made our own maps using symbols (and keys to decode them) to represent our classrooms, Olympic villages, places local to us and places from our imaginations.





We had a visit from the Newbury and District Agricultural Society and the lovely Buttercup the cow!

We learned all about cows and where milk comes from and all the steps involved in getting it to our houses. We even got to see Buttercup's passport that she gets stamped whenever she leaves the farm.

Before she left, Buttercup needed milking, so everyone got to experience what it is like to milk a cow by hand, it was quite tiring!







This term, Year 2 have been learning about the Astonishing Achievement of the invention of the train, looking at both Robert Stephenson and Isambard Kingdom Brunel. The children have enjoyed a trip to the STEAM museum in Swindon, dressing up as some of our key historical characters as well as exploring the museum. It was a great trip, and we are very grateful to all the adults who came along and made it possible.













In Maths, we have enjoyed learning about temperature and capacity. We have been learning how to read a thermometer, as well as scales on jugs and containers. The children enjoyed being outside and trying some challenges, including filling four cups to one quarter, one half, three quarters and one third.













Key Stage One have had a visit from Buttercup the Cow! We listened to our visitor explain how the cows are milked in big milking barns, and the children were able to have a go at milking Buttercup themselves!







Year 2 also had a go at being engineers... we were set the challenge of building a table out of a piece of A4 paper. We could only use the piece of paper, glue and scissors, and had to create a table that could hold the weight of a glue stick for 30 seconds! It was much harder than we thought...







Year 3 had a very busy half term planning and preparing for our Eco-market. The children really enjoyed baking, making, planting and pricing up their wares. They even made cakes with the eggs from our school hens and cookies topped with jam made from strawberries we grew ourselves! Thank you to everyone who supported the market, we raised £145 which will be shared out between their Year 4 classes to spend on enhancing their learning opportunities.

In Maths, we have been revisiting telling the time and learning how to tell the time on an analogue clock. We then moved on to working out durations of time such as "how long is it until playtime?" and "If my TV show lasts 20 minutes, when will it end?" The summer holidays are the perfect time to practice these skills with your children; keeping up the focus on telling the time with your child at home will make a huge difference to their confidence and fluency!

In English, the children have enjoyed researching about amazing people and their astonishing achievements. Inspired by the 'Little People, Big Dreams' series, they are applying their research to writing the life stories of their chosen people.

Year 4 takes on The Romans!

This term, we have been looking at our Big Idea of 'Astonishing Achievements' and immersing ourselves in Roman life. We have been reading the 'Roman Soldier's handbook' and using this as the basis for our non-chronological reports on roman life. The children have also been exploring the impact of this period on life on Britain today and how some of their achievements are still central to our communities.

A real highlight was Roman Day! All the children embraced becoming Romans with many dressing up in the most fantastic costumes! We all had a go at Italian bread making (with mixed results!), made up our own Route March and created beautiful mosaic tiles. We were lucky to be loaned Centurion artefacts from the West Berkshire museum, which really gave a sense of the life of a Roman soldier.

Year 5 have had a fantastic half term and have enjoyed exploring the natural world. They have been looking at Rivers in their Big Ideas lessons. The children have been successful in comparing rivers in the UK to the Amazon river, thinking about their features and similarities and differences. The children have worked hard on their brilliant river model projects. They have been able to use a range of different materials to demonstrate their understanding and have shown some excellent collaboration with their peers.
















In English, the children have enjoyed writing setting descriptions for their own world. They have used these setting descriptions creatively to imagine an animal that may live there, which is of their own design. The children have produced fantastic fact files about their animals, demonstrating a flexibility in how they write for purpose and use devices appropriately. Some have gone even further and created poetry about their creatures. We are so impressed

with how their writing has developed this year!



Year 6 were challenged to grow a £5 note! Across the year group, children worked collaboratively to develop their own businesses. They brainstormed ideas, pitched to their peers, created and sold their products and thought carefully about marketing techniques used by bigname brands.

After an initial sale amongst year 6, they used the proceeds to reinvest in their businesses and then did a second, bigger sale. It was great to see some unique ideas and children thinking mathematically to maximise profits and to adapt based on feedback. Final takings are being calculated to see who successfully grew £5. Well done year 6!
