##### Key Knowledge:

Artists can tell stories through drawings, models, sculptures, puppets, and other creative work.

They can use characters, settings, colour, shape, texture, and movement to share ideas and feelings.

Artists often plan ideas first, using sketches before making final work.

Materials such as paper, card, clay, fabric, and wood can be used to make story art and puppets and models can help bring stories to life.

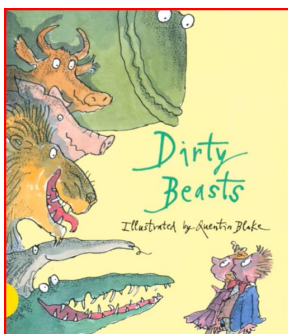

How can I use the ideas of other artists and illustrators to inspire me in my art work?

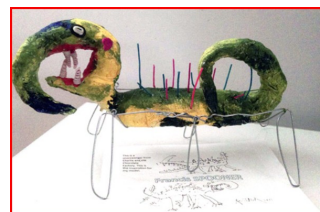
How can exaggerating shapes, colours, or features in your drawing help you show feelings, actions, or funny ideas more clearly?

##### Sketch and Clay characters



<b>Word</b>	<b>Meaning</b>
Illustration	A picture that helps tell a story
Character	A person, animal, or creature in a story
Setting	Where a story takes place
Expression	Feelings shown on a face or body
Texture	How something feels or looks like it feels
Sculpture	Art made in 3D
Model	A small 3D version of something
Puppet	A moving figure used to tell stories
Composition	How objects are arranged in artwork
Sketch	A quick practice drawing
Narrative	A story or sequence of events
Pattern	A repeated design
Shadow	A dark shape made when light is blocked
